## Chapter 8

Efther informeth the king that Mardocheus is her vncle, he is advanced in authoritie, 3. and contrarie letters are fent that the Iewes be faued, 11. and their enemies flayne. 15. Mardocheus is in high honour, and his whole nation is eftemed and feared by other people.

hat day king Affuerus gaue vnto Efther the queene the house of Aman the Iewes aduersarie, and Mardocheus went in before the kings prefence. For Efther confessed to him that he was her vncle. <sup>2</sup> And the king tooke the ring, which he had commanded to be taken agave from Aman, and deliuered it to Mardocheus. And Efther appointed Mardocheus also ouer her house. <sup>3</sup> Neither content with these things, she <sup>a)</sup>fel downe at the kings feete, and she wept and fpeaking to him prayed him, that he would command that the malice of Aman the Agagite, and his most wicked deuises, which he had inuented agaynft the Iewes, fhould be of none effect. <sup>4</sup> But he after the maner put forth the golden fcepter with his hand, by the which figne of clemencie was shewed: and fhe ryfing vp ftood before him, 5 and faid: If it pleafe the king, and if I have found grace in his eies, and my request seme not contrarie to him, I befech thee, that the old letters of Aman the traytour and enemie of the Iewes, wherein he commanded that in al the kings prouinces they fhould perish, may by new letters be corrected. <sup>6</sup> For how can I abide the murder and flaughter of my people? <sup>7</sup> And king Affuerus answered Efther the queene, and Mardocheus the Iewe: Amans house I have geven to Efther, and him felf I have commanded to be hanged on the gallowes, because he durft lay handes on the Iewes. 8 Write ye therfore to

the Iewes, as pleafeth you, in the kings name, figning the letters with my ring. For this was the cuftome, that no man durft fpeake againft the letters, which were fent in the kings name, and were figned with his ring. 9 And the kings fcribes and fecretaries being cald for (and it was the time of the third moneth, which is called Siban) the three and twenteth day therof letters were written, as Mardocheus would, to the Iewes, and to the princes, and the lieuftenantes and judges, which were rulers ouer the hundred and feuen and twentie prouinces, from India euen to Æthopia: to prouince and prouince, to people and people, according to their languages and characters, and to the Iewes, according as they could read, and heare. <sup>10</sup> And the faid letters, which were fent in the kings name, were figned with his ring, and fent by ryding poftes: which running through all the prouinces, should preuent the old letters with the new meffages. 11 To whom the king gaue commandment, that they fhould fpeake to the Iewes in euerie citie, and fhould command them to be gathered together in one, that they might ftand for their liues, and might kil and deftroy al their enemies with their wives and children and al their houses, and to take the spoyle of them. 12 And there was appointed through all the prouinces one day of reuenge, that is, the thirtenth of the twelfth moneth Adar. 13 And this was the content of the letter, that in all landes and peoples, which were fubiect to the empire of king Affuerus, it should be notified, the Iewes to be readie to be reuenged of their enemies. 14 And there went forth fwift poftes carving the meffages, and the kinges edict hong in Sufan. 15 But Mardocheus going forth out of the palace, and from the kinges prefence, shining in royal garmentes, to wit, hyacinthine and skie colour, bearing a golden crowne on his head, and clothed with a filke and purple cloke. And the citie rejoyfed, and was glad. <sup>16</sup> But to the Iewes there femed a new light to rife, iove, honour, and dauncing. 17 With al peoples, cities, and prouinces, whither foeuer the kinges commandmentes came, meruelous rejoyfing, feaftes, and banketes, and holie day: in fo much that manie of the

other nation and fect, were ioyned to their religion and ceremonies. For great terrour of the name of the Iewes had inuaded them al.
